

The UK's Newton Fund money is classed as ODA. Therefore the activities need to aim contribution to a <u>reduction in poverty</u>, and aim to further <u>sustainable development</u> or <u>improve the welfare</u> of the population of Newton Fund countries.





Newton- Katip Celebi Fund Distribution to Cities





- **Up to £12,000** for multiple visits in 2 years (incl. max. of £2,000 for research)
- ♣ British Academy provides support for only 1 year and up to £ 10k!
- ★ The scheme is intended to stimulate new collaborations!
- → The grant can be requested for one-off short visit or bilateral visits!
- → Travel costs to a third country is not covered!

2 years, on a full time basis

- Clinical and patient oriented research is supported by AMS!
- Applications from private/commercial organisations are not accepted!
- → In addition, 50% of the award will be provided to the UK host institution!



Global Challenges Research Fund

































GCRF is based on Sustainable Development Goals in the global context and part of UK aid strategy

Main objectives of GCRF:

- Address global challenges through disciplinary and interdisciplinary research
- Strengthening capability for research and innovation, within developing countries and the UK
- Agile response to emergencies and opportunities

The GCRF is a five year £1.5 billion funding stream to support cutting-edge research which addresses the problems faced by developing countries.





Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy BEIS is coordinating the Fund with delivery partners of Newton Fund in addition to UK Higher Education Funding bodies and UK Space Agency.

GCRF forms part of the UK's **ODA commitment**.

The definition of ODA eligible research provided by the OECD is that the primary purpose must be to promote the economic growth or welfare of developing countries: www.oecd.org/dac/stats/methodology.htm



Newton Fund versus GCRF



Same **primary** and **secondary** objectives:

- -to promote economic development and social welfare of developing countries
- -to contribute to the continued strength of the UK's research and innovation base and our wider prosperity and global influence

Newton Fund

- Requires partnership with one of **18 specific partner countries**, identified as emerging knowledge economies
- Partner countries provide **match funding** for every programme
- Primarily focused on **Middle Income**Countries on the OECD DAC list

GCRF

- Allows proposals addressing more widespread issues rather than requiring partnership with a specific country
- Match funding not required
- Covers any countries included on the **OECD DAC list**

Call for Interdisciplinary Research Hubs to Address Intractable Challenges Faced by Developing Countries

Established and led by eligible UK research organisations

- √ 12-15 Hubs (depending on quality)
- √ £8M 20M budget for each hub
- √ a 5 year period starting on 1st December 2018

Timeline for Assessment:

Intention to Submit 29th September 2017

Full proposal deadline 24 May 2018!!!

Decisions November 2018

Hubs start December 2018
